

Awarding Body: Edexcel

History GCSE Specific Unit Content:

Paper 1: A breadth study of crime and punishment through time. Students will look at how the nature of crime, the purpose of punishment and the organisation of law enforcement have changed from 1066 up to the present day. They will analyse factors behind such changes. For example, the impact of religion, the role of the media on changing attitudes and latterly, the development of technology and science.

Paper 2: The Cold War and The Anglo Saxons and Normans. The Cold War (1941-1991) will look at the developing tensions between the USA and the USSR, analysing key areas of influences over post war Europe, the growing nuclear threat and superpower tension around the world. For example, Cuba. The Anglo Saxon and Normans topic will focus on the Norman conquest of Britain and its impact on English government and society.

Paper 3: German 1919 – 1939. This course will focus on the collapse of the Weimar Republic and the rise of Adolf Hitler and the Nazis. Students will investigate how terror and propaganda were used to maintain a Nazi dictatorship, and what life was like for different groups of people under Nazi rule.
